

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ENGAGING HOMELESS STUDENTS IN Podcasting

Planning

Identify Podcast Goals & Objectives



Collaborating with students, adult supporters can establish boundaries and guidelines for discussing personal experiences, ensuring that students feel safe and comfortable when sharing their stories. By reminding students to refrain from disclosing identifying information or compromising details, adult supporters foster an atmosphere of trust and security within the podcast community, encouraging listeners to openly share their thoughts and experiences.

In addition, adult supporters can educate students on the importance of maintaining confidentiality while engaging with listeners online. Students should be reminded to exercise discretion, refraining from divulging personal information or sensitive details about themselves or others. By nurturing responsible and respectful online behavior, students develop a deeper understanding of the significance of confidentiality and actively safeguard their privacy.



By embracing the 4 P's of podcasting with homeless students, adult supporters can empower their students to share their stories, perspectives, and experiences with the world, while nurturing their creativity, communication skills, and self-confidence.

AVOIDING TOKENISM & AULTISM BEST PRACTICES

Tokenism is a practice in which a marginalized individual or group is given a small, superficial, or symbolic role or representation to create an illusion of inclusivity or diversity. It often involves using individuals or groups as mere tokens to showcase diversity without providing meaningful opportunities for genuine participation, influence, or decision-making power.

Adultism refers to the systemic and cultural bias against young people, where adults assert dominance and control over young individuals, often dismissing their perspectives, ideas, and capabilities solely based on their age. It involves disregarding the agency, autonomy, and expertise of young people, and instead prioritizing adult opinions and decisions.

To avoid tokenism and adultism when working with students on a podcast about their experiences of homelessness, it is important to follow some best practices:

- Genuine inclusion: Ensure that the involvement of homeless students in the podcast project goes beyond mere representation. Offer meaningful opportunities for them to participate, contribute, and have decision-making power throughout the entire process.
- Respect and validation: Treat homeless students as equal partners and value their unique perspectives and lived experiences. Create a supportive and respectful environment where their voices are heard and acknowledged.
- Collaboration and shared decision-making: Involve homeless students in decision-making processes related to the podcast, such as topic selection, episode structure, and content creation. Collaborate with them as co-creators rather than imposing ideas or controlling the narrative.
- Empowerment and agency: Provide opportunities for homeless students to take on leadership roles within the podcast project. Encourage them to express their ideas, make choices, and exercise their agency. Support their growth and development throughout the process.
- Education and skill-building: Offer resources, guidance, and training to help homeless students develop the necessary skills for podcasting, such as interviewing techniques, storytelling, audio editing, and scriptwriting. Empower them to enhance their communication and technical abilities.
- Ongoing support and mentorship: Provide continuous support, mentorship, and feedback to homeless students throughout the podcasting journey. Create a safe space for them to express their concerns, ask questions, and seek guidance.

By following these best practices, adult supporters can create a collaborative, inclusive, and empowering environment for homeless students participating in the podcast enabling them to share their stories authentically while challenging tokenism and adultism in the process.

ENSURING STUDENT SAFETY &

Podcasting has become an influential medium for giving voice to various student populations, including those experiencing homelessness. However, when working with vulnerable students, ensuring confidentiality and safety takes precedence. Adult supporters hold a vital role in safeguarding the privacy of homeless students and creating a secure podcasting environment.

To begin, establishing trust and boundaries is crucial. Adult supporters must create a safe and supportive space where homeless students feel comfortable sharing their experiences. Clear boundaries should be set regarding the topics that can be discussed on the podcast, ensuring that personal and sensitive information remains confidential. Encouraging students to use pseudonyms or alter identifying details can further protect their privacy.

Obtaining informed consent and release forms is another essential step. Prior to recording, adult supporters should seek consent from students and their parents or guardians. It is important to educate all parties involved about the podcasting process, potential risks, and benefits. Consent and release forms should outline the purpose of the podcast, its intended audience, and the confidentiality measures in place. This ensures that everyone is aware of their rights and responsibilities. If your students are under 18, parental permission should be obtained when posting each podcast. Regularly communicate with students and their guardians to address any concerns or questions regarding privacy and consent. Ensure students understand that they are allowed to withdraw consent or request modifications if needed. Respect their decisions and make necessary adjustments to ensure their comfort and safety throughout the podcasting journey.

Implementing technical measures for privacy is equally significant. Adult supporters should guide students in using appropriate techniques to safeguard their privacy. For example, establish a rule for your students to provide personal safety that no last names are to be used. You can also consider using pseudonyms or fake names, like "Ro Dog" or "Jazz Fan", which can also allow students to express themselves more creatively. Teaching students how to edit audio files to remove accidental disclosures of personal information is crucial. Ensure students do not share details that may reveal their school or work schedules, for example, if they ride their bike down a certain street, or even if they wear particular clothing. Encouraging the use of secure virtual meeting platforms during live recordings or interviews can also protect student identities.

Promoting media literacy and digital citizenship is an essential aspect of ensuring student safety. Adult supporters should offer guidance to students about responsible digital behavior and media literacy. Teaching them to navigate potential risks, such as online harassment or bullying, is essential. Critical thinking skills should be encouraged to evaluate the appropriateness of content, and students should be equipped with strategies for responding constructively to negative comments or feedback.

Emotional support and well-being play a vital role in ensuring the safety of homeless students in podcasting. It is important for adult supporters to be prepared to provide emotional support and access to counseling resources. Regular check-ins and open communication channels allow students to express any concerns or discomfort they may have regarding the content they are sharing.

Sharing your story about your experiences, and about what's important to you, is an easy and effective way to create change, start conversations and connect with the people around you. This can be especially powerful for young people who do not always feel that they have the chance to help others. However, there can be risks in sharing your story on the Youth Voice Amplified podcast that we want you to know. First, it is important for you to imagine what the impact of sharing your story on a podcast will be on you and those who are part of your story. It may be uncomfortable to bring up trauma associated with your story. Storytellers on Youth Voice Amplified will be offered emotional support during and after telling their stories on the podcast in addition to linking you to additional community resources and services. It may be helpful to let a trusted parent or guardian, friend, counselor or teacher know that you plan to share your story. That way, they can be there for you before and afterwards, if needed.

Stories in the digital world last forever, so we also want you to consider the exposure that your story will bring to you. Once information is shared and accessible by the public, there is no going back and it can be difficult to contain. It is important for you to consider how sharing your story could impact future employment, academic pursuits, a court or legal case, and relationships with family and friends – now or in the future.

With that being said, please also know that sharing your story can make a difference in many ways-to your own life, other youth, and to the community. For example, sharing your story has the potential to help someone else feel less alone. Have you listened to someone talk about their life and thought, 'Wow, someone else has been through that too? I thought it was just me!' Lived experiences like yours also have the power to reduce stigmas and to inform and educate others. In addition, schools and programs that meaningfully incorporate youth voice into their programming provide more responsive services.

Youth who have taken part in the Youth Voice Amplified podcast have also told us that sharing their story was healing and it benefited them to know that their personal stories did matter and their insight was valued. Some youth storytellers also reported that they gained confidence from such opportunities to build awareness of issues that matter to them and be part of the solution to a problem. With these benefits and risks in mind, please remember that it is still perfectly okay if you decide to pull back and not do the podcast at any time.

By establishing trust, setting boundaries, obtaining informed consent, implementing technical privacy measures, providing emotional support, and promoting media literacy, adult supporters create a secure environment where homeless students can share their stories.

PODCAST REFLECTION & Evaluation



When evaluating podcasts created with homeless students, adult supporters should take into account the unique circumstances of these students and the specific goals of the project. Several aspects should be considered during the evaluation process:

Student Voice & Empowerment: Adult supporters prioritize assessing the extent to which the podcasts amplify the voices and perspectives of homeless students. It is essential to gauge whether the students feel empowered and have a genuine sense of ownership over the content they share, as this reflects the success of the student voice strategy.

Relevance & Authenticity: The authenticity and relevance of the topics discussed in the podcasts stand as crucial elements for evaluation. Adult supporters carefully consider if the content genuinely reflects the experiences, challenges, and interests of homeless students. They assess whether the podcasts provide a platform that sheds light on important issues, allowing the students to share their stories authentically.

Communication Skills: The evaluation process focuses on the students' communication skills and their ability to effectively convey their messages and experiences. Researchers thoughtfully consider if the students demonstrate clarity, articulation, and confidence in their delivery, as these aspects reflect their growth in communication.

Inclusion & Representation: The evaluation emphasizes the fostering of inclusivity and representation in the podcasts. Adult supporters carefully consider if diverse perspectives and voices are thoughtfully included, reflecting the varied experiences of homeless students. They assess whether the podcasts successfully create a sense of belonging and promote understanding among listeners.

Engagement & Impact: The level of engagement the podcasts elicit from the audience, both within the school community and beyond, becomes a pivotal point of evaluation. The student team can explore if the podcasts provoke thought, prompt discussions, or raise awareness about the experiences of homeless students. Additionally, they evaluate if the podcasts have a positive impact on the listeners' understanding, empathy, or attitudes towards homelessness.

Student Growth & Learning: The evaluation process delves into the students' growth and learning throughout the podcasting journey. Adult supporters consider if the students have developed new skills, such as interviewing, storytelling, or audio editing. Moreover, they assess if the students have gained confidence, self-expression, and a profound sense of accomplishment through their involvement in the podcasts.

Feedback from Students & Partners: Gathering feedback from the students themselves, as well as educators, parents, and community members who have listened to the podcasts, is paramount. To ensure a comprehensive evaluation, your team can utilize a variety of methods, such as surveys, interviews, and focus groups, which allow them to gather diverse perspectives and understand the podcast's strengths and areas for improvement. For example, students can create surveys or encourage listeners to leave reviews and comments, helping them understand their audience's preferences, interests, and concerns.

Analyzing listener feedback informs content development and ensures that the podcast remains relevant and impactful. Understanding how the podcast has resonated with listeners, what they have learned, and if it has prompted discussions or raised awareness about the topics covered helps them gauge the podcast's broader impact. Using this valuable feedback, the team can refine the podcasting process, making improvements and tailoring future episodes to better meet the needs and interests of the students and audience.

Sensitive & Empathetic Approach: Throughout the evaluation process, adult supporters must adopt a sensitive and empathetic approach, honoring the unique circumstances of homeless students. Find frequent opportunities to celebrate the voices, growth, and positive impact the students make through their podcasts. This celebration stands as a vital element of the evaluation process, contributing to the continuous refinement of the podcasting process and enhancing the students' overall experience.

Adult supporters should actively engage students in all stages of the evaluation process, involving them in discussions and decision-making based on the evaluation's outcomes. By encouraging them to provide input and ideas for enhancing future episodes, you will foster a collaborative and student-centered approach.

Listening Duration: Average time listeners spend listening to episodes. Longer listening durations indicate higher engagement with your content.

Subscriber Growth: Tracking growth of subscriber base over time will demonstrate your podcast's ability to attract and retain an audience.

Listening Platforms: Understanding which platforms (e.g., Apple, Spotify) your audience uses can help optimize distribution strategies.

Guest Impact: If feature guests, evaluating their influence on listener engagement and download numbers can inform guest selection strategies.

This is where funding mechanisms like the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) for California school districts and other school funding options can play a significant role.

The LCFF is a funding formula implemented in California to allocate funds to school districts based on the number of students they serve, with additional funds for students from low-income families, English learners, and foster youth. The formula allows schools to have more flexibility in deciding how to use the funds to meet the specific needs of their students, including homeless students. By engaging with the LCFF, educators, and schools can advocate for allocating funds to support podcasting initiatives for homeless students, including equipment, software, and other resources.

In addition to the LCFF, schools can explore other funding sources, such as grants, sponsorships, and community partnerships. Grant opportunities focused on education, youth empowerment, or homelessness initiatives can provide essential financial support for sustaining and expanding the podcast with homeless students. Local businesses, community organizations, and media outlets may also be interested in sponsoring the podcast, especially if it aligns with their corporate social responsibility goals or community outreach efforts.





As we approach the end of this guidebook, we would like to share some valuable lessons we have learned from the Youth Voice Amplified podcast. One essential lesson is to start small, offering attainable projects to build confidence and momentum. Beginning with 30-second individual audio pieces allows students to practice their recording and storytelling skills. Gradually increasing the complexity and scope of assignments, tailored to each student's abilities and resources, helps them gain proficiency before tackling more extensive projects.

Don't give up early on! Just like any form of content, it will take time for your students to nurture and develop their podcasting skills and comfort. Encourage them and celebrate all achievements of their podcasting journey, big and small. Showcase their work within the school community and beyond, amplifying their voices and promoting understanding and empathy for their experiences.

Inclusivity is key, and we believe in offering all students a range of roles and opportunities, such as hosting, interviewing, guest research, artwork, scripting, writing and playing theme music, editing, or managing social media, to ensure a meaningful podcasting experience for everyone. Additionally, we've recognized the importance of flexibility and accessibility when working with students who have experienced homelessness and trauma. Providing flexible scheduling for podcasting sessions and ensuring access to necessary equipment and resources acknowledges their unique circumstances and barriers.

And finally...Relax! Remind yourself and your students that you do not need to be experts in all aspects of podcasting. More importantly, encourage your students to learn from their mistakes, ask for help, and take creative chances. We have saying at Youth Voice Amplified "You got to be a disaster, before you become a master!" There is no one-sizefits-all approach to podcasting, and it is more important to value creativity, adaptability, and finding each student's unique voice and style within the podcasting world.


PODCAST MONTHLY TIMELINE





Use your active listening skills if you need those skills to learn them.

Always do your research on each subject for each guest.

Do your homework about your guest and have a preinterview meeting with each quest so they are comfortable.

Make sure to have good time management. Your time isn't always your own, so please remember to use your calendar and keep our appointments.

"See a need fill a need" basically, if your guest needs a resource, and you know it connects them to it off the air, of course.

- Get used to hearing your voice on record.
- Actively listen to your guest without interrupting.
- Make your guest feel as comfortable as possible

Hype your guest up. Being on a podcast can be nervous for them, so make sure they feel as confident as you can make them.





FAQs About Being A Storyteller on Youth Voice Amplified

Before you decide whether or not to participate in our Youth Voice Amplified podcast, here is some information about the podcast to consider. We hope that after you read these answers to these frequently asked questions about the podcast you will better understand your rights to share your story in a way that respects your boundaries.

1. What is Youth Voice Amplified?

Youth Voice Amplified Podcast is a project within the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office. Our mission is to give every young person a platform to tell their story and create positive change around them.

2. What is a podcast?

The Cambridge Dictionary defines a podcast as a program made available in digital audio or video files that a user can download from the Internet to a personal device to listen to at their convenience. Podcasts can vary in style, format, and content, but usually, a podcast series will feature one or more recurring hosts discussing a particular topic like video games or starting your own business. Also, the discussion and content within a podcast can range from carefully scripted to completely improvised or in the moment.

3. Why do you want to hear my story?

Lots of people are talking about youth voice today. Youth voice can mean many things but Youth Voice Amplified defines youth voice as the ideas, opinions, involvement, and initiative of people considered to be "young." We understand that these voices often go unheard and/or involvement with youth has often been marginalized. Therefore, Youth Voice Amplified lifts up the wisdom and insight of young people and what their testimonies and experiences tell us. How will we know what youth need, or what works and what doesn't work without hearing what young people have to say?

Lived experiences like yours also have the power to reduce stigmas and to inform and educate others as well as inspire youth who may be on the same journey as you. However, please remember that your decision to share your story is a personal choice - one that should never be forced upon you for any reason.

4. What is the goal of this podcast?

Youth can be champions and influencers for their own futures and other youth, however, we know that many youth voices aren't being heard right now. Overall, the goal of Youth Voice Amplified is to

give a platform for every young person to tell their story and create positive change. Our podcast audience can be anyone, however your story will be of particular relevance to those in education and youth-serving organizations who want to learn from your first-hand experiences and consider new ways to meet the needs of youth sharing the same experiences.

Each podcast episode is also developed as a resource for youth and by youth. Whether it be to hear their peers speak about overcoming challenges, being resilient in the face of adversity, or personal stories of inspiration, the podcasts are also resources for youth who seek advice and support from individuals their own age.

Youth Voice Amplified podcast recordings will be free to all listeners. No profit will be made from your story.

5. What can I expect if I agree to do this?

If you agree to participate, we will first ask you to participate in a one-hour to 90 minute conversation with hosts Gennessa Fisher and Brian Johnson either in person at the Dream Center or via Zoom at a date and time of your choosing. The questions Gennessa and Brian will discuss with you will be emailed to you a week before the first meeting. The Youth Voice Amplified team can also assist with transportation.

Telling your story may be a new and somewhat scary experience. At the first meeting, Gennessa and Brian will review the interview questions with you, answer your questions, and show you the recording equipment. So you are more comfortable telling your story, Gennessa and Brian will work with you on telling your story and give you opportunities to practice speaking with them, both on and off the microphone. You can also write down the answers to your interview questions on cards that you can refer to during the podcast recording.

Next, you will set a time and date for your interview recording at the Kern County Superintendent of Schools recording studio at 1300 17th Street in Bakersfield. Interviews can go as long as two hours or as short as 45 minutes. Voice Voice Amplified staff can also assist you with transportation services to and from the recording studio. At any time during the interview, you are welcome to stop and either schedule a later time to record or end your participation with the project. After the recording is over, Youth Voice Amplified hosts and staff will invite you to share a meal with them and talk about your experience recording the episode.

Soon after, a 'first cut' will be sent to you for comment and a 'final version' will be sent to you for your approval before the recording is uploaded. At these times, you can have anything you shared removed that you are uncomfortable with.

As compensation for your time we are offering a \$100 stipend upon your review and approval of the completed recording. You can stop participation at ANY time and still receive \$30.

Our storytellers (You) and your story will be treated with respect at all times. We will try to preserve the integrity of the story. We will always try to be flexible and sensitive to the needs of storytellers with regard to the place and pace of recording.

Our goal throughout this process is to create a safe and welcoming space where you can share your story and the challenges you are facing during this time, so please let us know what we can do to make this the best experience for you!

6. What are you going to do with my story? Where will it be housed? Who will be listening to it?

The recording of your story will only be an audio recording and it will first be housed on a website on the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office. In addition, the podcast will be uploaded to Spotify through Buzzsprout Podcasting software. The podcast's audience is anyone, including youth as young as 13, however, we will be promoting the podcast to schools and youth-serving agencies for service improvement.

7. Are you going to tell me what I can say or what can't I say?

We want you to speak your truth. You are the expert of your own lived experiences. If you decide to share your story, be yourself and share from your viewpoint. You are not obligated to speak for anyone but yourself. You can also choose what parts of your story you would like to share. There may be aspects of your story that you don't feel comfortable sharing with others and you would like to keep private, and that is okay. In this case, it may be helpful for you to consider what other details you want to share that you believe will be the most helpful to the school and agency staff and youth who are listening.

The audience for this podcast is anyone, including youth as young as 13. We will be also promoting the podcast as a resource for schools and youth-serving agencies who wish to improve their services. Therefore, please limit excessive profanity that may distract listeners from your story and avoid inappropriate sexual references.

We ask that your story on the podcast cannot threaten others or do anything that deliberately smears another person who is out of the public eye. When referring to specific people, schools, and programs, only use names for positive comments. In other words, if you have something critical or a negative experience to share, please do not use names.

Youth Voice Amplified is part of the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office and the office's non-discrimination policy prohibits discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying based on actual or perceived ancestry, age, color, disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sex, sexual orientation, marital or parental status or association with a person or a group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

Youth Voice Amplified staff will reserve final editing rights to the podcast content in order to meet the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office's non-discrimintation policy and guidelines described above.

8. How will you protect my identity?

Your privacy and safety are our priority, however, the nature of a storytelling podcast cannot guarantee anonymity and absolute confidentiality. Even though it is audio and faceless, some people may recognize you by your voice or from details in your story. To help you maintain your privacy, the Youth Voice Amplified team will ask you to adopt a pseudonym or a fake first name. This name will be used during the interview and as part of the title. You will also be asked to use pseudonyms for family and friends who are part of your story, and to not share home addresses, phone numbers, social media account information, or any other information that may identify you. Again, we take seriously the privacy of our storytellers who participate in this podcast. If you have concerns about your safety, before or after the recording, please contact our team immediately.

9. What are possible risks and benefits from sharing my story publicly?

Sharing your story about your experiences, and about what's important to you, is an easy and effective way to create change, start conversations and connect with the people around you. This can

be especially powerful for young people who do not always feel that they have the chance to help others. However, there can be risks in sharing your story on the Youth Voice Amplified podcast that we want you to know. First, it is important for you to imagine what the impact of sharing your story on a podcast will be on you and those who are part of your story. It may be uncomfortable to bring up trauma associated with your story. Storytellers on Youth Voice Amplified will be offered emotional support during and after telling their stories on the podcast in addition to linking you to additional community resources and services. It may be helpful to let a trusted parent or guardian, friend, counselor or teacher know that you plan to share your story. That way, they can be there for you before and afterwards, if needed.

Stories in the digital world last forever, so we also want you to consider the exposure that your story will bring to you. Once information is shared and accessible by the public, there is no going back and it can be difficult to contain. It is important for you to consider how sharing your story could impact future employment, academic pursuits, a court or legal case, and relationships with family and friends - now or in the future.

With that being said, please also know that sharing your story can make a difference in many waysto your own life, other youth, and to the community. For example, sharing your story has the potential to help someone else feel less alone. Have you listened to someone talk about their life and thought, 'Wow, someone else has been through that too? I thought it was just me!' Lived experiences like yours also have the power to reduce stigmas and to inform and educate others. In addition, schools and programs that meaningfully incorporate youth voice into their programming provide more responsive services.

Youth who have taken part in our previous storytelling projects have also told us that sharing their story was healing and it benefited them to know that their personal stories did matter and their insight was valued. Some youth storytellers also reported that they gained confidence from such opportunities to build awareness of issues that matter to them and be part of the solution to a problem. With these benefits and risks in mind, please remember that it is still perfectly okay if you decide to pull back and not do the podcast at any time.

10. Am I ready to share?

Take time to ask yourself if you are ready to share your story with others. If you don't feel ready or comfortable doing so, you don't have to. Even if you have shared your story publicly before, you still have the right to say no.

11. What if I change my mind about sharing my story or if I want the recording taken down afterwards?

We will not record a story unless we have your prior permission and signed consent from you; we will provide whatever information is necessary about the process and answer your questions so such consent can be given. After you have reviewed the final recording, you will be asked to sign a consent form agreeing to the use of the final version of the story as an educational and learning resource intended to improve the quality and responsiveness of services for youth and students in our community.

You can withdraw your consent or participation at any stage of the process, including after the recording is published. If you want a recording to be taken down, please contact Kim Silva at <u>kisilva@kern.org</u> or call 661-636-4900. Your recording will be removed from the Kern County

Superintendent of Schools website and from the Spotify podcast directory within 24 hours of a business day after receiving your request and confirming your identity as the Storyteller.

12. What can I expect after I do the podcast?

Sharing your story may be an emotional experience. In addition to debriefing with our Youth Voice Amplified team, it may be helpful to let a trusted parent or guardian, friend, counselor or teacher know that you plan to share your story. That way, they can be there for you before and afterwards, if needed.

Gennessa and Brian will check in with you after the podcast airs and ask you how you felt about it. If you like, we would like to maintain contact with you and include you as an ongoing part of our Youth Voice Amplified community and future events. This could be gatherings with other guests, leadership development workshops, youth advisory committees, or other storytelling events.

13. Who can I contact if I need more information?

Your participation in Youth Voice Amplified is voluntary.
