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School Profile

Burroughs High School is a small rural high school on the west side of Kern County with a student enrollment of 1,523 students. The school has a strong support services division that includes that touts 4 academic counselors, 1 behavior specialist, Department of Defense counselor, Military Counselor, plus adult supervisors by way of 4 noon supervisors and 2 Sheriff Resource Officers. With strong District support, ELA teachers have the autonomy to attend workshops outside of the District as a department, which affords the staff to have the up and coming cutting edge ideas as well as time to collaborate with each other in regards to how the strategies and practices could be implemented.

School Demographics

Burroughs High School population includes 2 predominant populations with 57.5% white, 25.2% Hispanic/Latino, and 5.5% African American. The student subgroups include 57.6% Socioeconomically Disadvantaged Students, 3.8% English Learners and 12% Students with Disabilities.

Contributing/ Replicable Factors

#1.) Network and collaboration with outside agencies.

#2.) Collaboration and Research within ELA department during contract hours.

- Late Start Wednesdays give one hour of time for teachers in ELA department to review student data and look at lessons for equity from classroom to classroom within department.
- Pacing calendar and Lessons are teacher generated as an ELA community of learners.
- ELA Department classrooms are within close proximity for easy collaboration.
- Teachers break into grade level teams and focus on key passages with question stems embedded in lessons similar to CAASPP.
- Once a month research done within CDE digital library
- PLC within ELA department includes Sp. Ed. and ELD teacher helps with scaffolding of lessons for multiple subgroups of students.

#3.) Expository Reading and Writing Course (ERWC) used in English and History class.

#4.) Articulation from grade levels and ability levels-Teachers have assignments in all grade levels and tracks (Advanced Placement and College Prep).

#5.) Students are writing and using Chromebooks to submit writing assignments through [Turnitin.com](https://www.turnitin.com).

- Students practice a variety of writing styles
- Turnitin.com submission which calls for peer review, peer classroom, with standardized feedbacks from teachers to students.
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#6.) Ongoing Assessment -

- Teachers look at 8th grade CAASPP scores
- Writing Benchmark is given each quarter modeled after CAASPP and IABs.
- Junior year ICA's are given
 - 1 month prior to CAASPP as an English Department and go over mini lessons after reviewing results.
 - Teachers review results with each student and give ideas on how to improve.
- Grades are reviewed each quarter in PLC for all teachers. Transparency has occurred for three years.
- PDSA is used following review of grades.
