This accreditation is for groups as described above that are also utilizing an integrated service delivery system for providing families with multidisciplinary, strength-based case management and support services.




Accreditation Benefits:

Community Concern: High living costs are increasing **food** and **healthcare needs** for local families.

Key Strategies:

• **Provide temporary food assistance** through an emergency pantry and monthly distributions.

Partner with Kern Family Health and Omni for healthcare resources.

When services aren't available locally, refer families to 211 for additional help.

East Kern Collaborative & Family Resource Centers

East Kern FRC (Mojave) & Oasis FRC (Ridgecrest)

Food Distribution <u>Community Concerns:</u> East Kern faces ongoing challenges with **food insecurity, lack of affordable housing,** and **limited medical and mental health services**. <u>Key Strategies</u>:

- In Quarter 1 (July-September 2025), we served 2,888 individuals with food assistance, emergency clothing, baby items, utility help, laundry services, and more.
- Referring families to **Mobile Clinics and** to **medical offices** in East Kern County, provide **bus tickets and gas cards** for families facing a medical condition and needing immediate medical care.
- Refer individuals to our **M Street Navigation program**, **Flood Ministries**, **and the Open-Door Network** if families are involved. Continue to seek more resources for unhoused clients within East Kern County.

Greenfield HELPS Collaborative & Family Resource Center

Community Concern: The greatest current need is health services
 —driven by rising referrals for mental health, general care,
 immunizations, and increased demand for food and clothing.

- We've partnered with **Omni Family Health**, **Kern Medical**, **Clinica Sierra Vista**, **Kern Family Health Care**, and others to bring **mobile health units** to Greenfield, providing essential care directly to the community.
- Partnered with **CAPK's Food Bank**, which provides families with food baskets monthly. Have an on-site district-wide **clothing bank** to provide essentials to families in need.
- Collaborate with multiple partners to deliver innovative workshops on family health, mental health, nutrition, and substance use prevention.

Indian Wells Valley (IWV) Community Collaborative

IWV Community Collaborative meetings bring local agencies together to share resources and services —critical in these rural, isolated areas. Regular participants include behavioral health providers, domestic violence resources, early childhood education agencies, veteran services, local churches, and employment agencies, ensuring families know what support is available.

The largest incorporated community is Ridgecrest, with other unincorporated communities including Inyo Kern, Pearsonville, and China Lake—the population of 4.76K and growing at a rate of 1.04% annually. All of these resources have been problematic in accessing for the outlying areas. The availability of affordable rental homes has decreased dramatically, making it difficult for the lower-income families we serve to find appropriate housing. We continue to support organizations working with families/clients that way they are aware of the resources that are available to them.



Kern River Valley Family Resource Center Collaborative



<u>Community Concern</u>: Family Support Services and Healthcare Needs.



Key Strategies:

- Provide workshops that support early child development, such as Parents As Teachers, Nurturing Parenting Classes, Diabetes Prevention, Red Cross CPR & Child/Infant CPR Course for Parents/Caregivers, and Emergency Preparedness Training.
- Provide mobile clinics in partnership with CSV, offer telehealth services for Kern Family Health Care members, and collaborate with local sites to recruit specialists and expand access to mental health and primary care.
- Provide Toys for Tots, Angel Program for the holiday season, and host Family Nights
 Activities throughout the year.

Lost Hills Collaborative & Family Resource Center

Community Concerns:

Family Supportive Services such as **Food, Clothing, and Healthcare**. As well as **Early Childhood Education**.

Key Strategies:

- Monthly food commodities distribution in partnership with the **CAPK Food Bank**, food resources through partnership with **Gleaners Food Bank**, and **Chevron** for food during the holidays.
- Collaborate with agencies to connect families to essential supports, including medical enrollment outreach, renewals, wellness workshops, and Kern Family Health Care's Enhanced Care Management services.
- Case Manage families to provide services through the home-based and center-based programs using the Parents As Teachers evidence-based curriculum.
- Collaborated with **Kern County Library**, **Chevron**, **Kern County Child Support**, **and Lost Hills Parks & Recreation** to host some Back to School Events and provide a backpack giveaway with school supplies and books.

McFarland Community Collaborative & Family Resource Center

Community Concerns: Healthcare, Emotional Well-being, and the Safety of the children of McFarland. As well as the need for Early Childhood Education, Stable Jobs, Housing, and Utility Assistance.

- Provide **school readiness** for children 3-5 years of age.
- Work with collaborative partners to bring programs to McFarland that promote positive children's health and wellness services.
- Link families to services available in the community and educate parents about community programs.



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Mountain Community Collaborative & Family Resource Center -Fraiser Park

<u>Community Concern:</u> The community is located in the mountains, which can distance families from accessing **health services, stable housing,** and other supportive services such as **food** and **basic needs**.

Key Strategies:

- We provide families with linkage to temporary **food assistance** through local churches and resources.
- Continue to link Medi-Cal recipients that are covered by **Kern Family Health Care** to local resources and **transportation** assistance to get **basic healthcare needs** met.

Richardson Special Needs Collaborative



Community Concern: The collaborative is observing several trends developing in the needs of the families we serve. We have noticed an increase in housing, growing needs for childcare, basic needs, and financial needs.

- Working closely with Health insurance,
 Behavioral therapists, and partnering with food banks, this helps
 communication to ensure the needs of the families are met.
- We are providing parent training for those who have children with special needs, some of the topics are behavioral, knowledge of child development, and safety.
- We are also providing families with basic needs and referrals to resources.



Shafter Collaborative & Family Resource Center

Community Concern: The collaborative is observing several trends in the needs of more low-income housing & utility assistance. Also, have noticed a growing need for **basic needs** and **financial needs**.

Key Strategies:

- Have collaborative speakers on housing options and work with community members/landlords.
- Partnered with Catholic Charities of Bakersfield to host food drives every other month, providing up to 250 bags of food at each event.
- Provides office space to **Medi-Cal Assistance** representative who assists clients with Medi-Cal needs and office space to **EDD** representative who assists with unemployment benefits and/or disability insurance benefits.

<u>Community Concern:</u> The collaborative is observing several trends in the need for more low-income housing & utility assistance. Also, have noticed a growing need for basic needs and resources linked to educational institutes.

Key Strategies:

• Improvement of the system of care for children and families by increasing coordination and collaboration of providers and connecting services and resources to families and children in schools. We are working on this primarily through providing regular meetings to support awareness of and collaboration with partner agencies, professional learning for staff providing direct family support, as well as through the above mentioned FRC-based one-stop resource centers that connect families to available resources.



Wasco Collaborative & Educational Resource Center

Community Concern: The need for more low-income housing, health and wellness, and food/clothing banks in the community. Also, have noticed a growing need for basic needs and transportation.

- We are working to understand the needs of families experiencing housing insecurity and developing supports to prevent displacement and improve stability.
- Focusing on access to local healthcare, mental health services, and wellness programs. (Partnerships with Omni Mobile Clinic, Kern Family Health, etc)
- Partnered with multiple agencies to develop and launch a centralized Resource Hub (both online and on-site) to connect families with services such as food assistance, healthcare, mental health support, academic resources, housing referrals, utility assistance, etc.
