The literature must be a published work available to all students; selections that are found only in distributions such as organizational newsletters, the Internet, video and audio recordings, and regional newspapers are not acceptable. The selection must be written by a known author. "Anonymous" or "author unknown" pieces are not acceptable.

GUIDELINES

- The student should select literature which can be presented as an oral interpretation.
- The literature should be appropriate for age, event, and presentation to a community audience.
- Text may be deleted from the original work to meet time requirements; however, text may not be added to or altered in any other way. Sound effects are allowed as written in the text, but may not be added.
- Appropriateness of both literature and mode of delivery is the responsibility of the site principal.
- The student should be so thoroughly familiar with the literature that the audience feels the author's intentions, thoughts, and attitudes coming to them directly through the student.
- If more than one selection is used, there must be an obvious relationship and the selections must be tied carefully together. Short transitions may be added as necessary.
- The student should use voice, pauses, and rate of speaking as means of interpreting the selection. Using skill to gain and to keep audience attention, the student should be persuasive in communicating the literature.
- The student may use appropriate and natural gestures to suggest the essence of the characters
 as the author saw them. The student may move around in front of the audience as appropriate
 for the selection, but must remain standing (no kneeling, lying down or moving about on the
 floor).

RULES

- 1. Timing of the speech begins with the student's *first* utterance.
- 2. The student must include the title and author (not anonymous) in the presentation.
- 3. The interpretation must be the student's, **not** an imitation of an actor's performance.
- 4. Student is *not* to announce his/her name, school, or district.
- 5. No props or costumes. School uniforms may be worn.
- 6. No prompting or directing from the audience.
- 7. The selection *must* be memorized.
- 8. The student must remain standing.

This presentation should be an interpretation of a literary work*, not an imitation of an actor's performance. The literature must be a published work available to all students; selections that are found only in distributions such as organizational newsletters, the Internet, video and audio recordings, and regional newspapers are not acceptable. The selection must be written by a known author. "Anonymous" and "author unknown" pieces are not acceptable.

GUIDELINES

- The students should select literature which can be presented chorally.
- The literature should be appropriate for age, event, and student presentation to a community audience.
- Text may be deleted from the original work to meet time requirements; however, text may not be added to or altered in any other way. Sound effects are allowed as written in the text but may not be added.
- Appropriateness of both literature and mode of delivery is the responsibility of the site principal.
- If more than one selection is used, there must be an obvious relationship and the parts must be tied together carefully. Short transitions may be added as necessary.
- Develop appropriate and interesting dialogues, parts, tonal qualities, and rhythmic qualities.
- Use a variety of small and large group parts.
- Blend voices, pause together, and put emphasis on the same words.
- Speak with appropriate expression, tempo, and volume; avoid "yelling" at the audience.
- There should be no solo or dominating voices.
- Reflect the author's viewpoint and mood.
- Use facial expressions and gestures that reflect the author's emotions and intentions.
- The event is an oral presentation. Only appropriate gestures should be used; no moving feet.
